RONNEBY REFLECTIONS

I've sailed pretty well most places in Europe, globe trotting with Olympic 470's and Fireballs, and one thing that always colours your memory of a place is your result. There is no real getting away from it. If your result is a mess, you usually remember the bad things about a venue. Ronneby must somehow be an exception for, although we were robbed of the title by the actions of the committee, my lasting memory of Ronneby is a good one. And the results are still subject to an appeal.

People make places and classes they say, and I think there is a lot of truth in that. There is no doubt that the actual geography of Sweden makes it a very beautiful place to be, but as a sailing venue one pays a price for all that scenery: the one and a half hours sail out and back from the start and finish each day; the transome—ripping boat—holing rocks that were littered everywhere, sometimes not marked. But I actually enjoyed most of that

The sail out every day made good prac-

tice for rig tuning and sailing off against other boats, and the first couple of return trips, having won the first two races, made for more excitement, as we tried to find the right spot on the coastline where the entrance might be. We actually overshot the inlet by a mile and a half the first day and ended up walking the boat back over an island. The organisers never missed us though. There was no signing off and anyway they were too busy protesting us for being too fast.

Yes, you could say, we are a little bitter about the way we were treated. It happens from time to time at meetings, that's sailing, but at a major international championship . . . I don't think I shall sail in Sweden again . . . a pity really for the sailors themselves were wonderful people who went out of their way to make us feel at home and the Ronneby Club did so much to make things work well, which for most aspects they did.

The one thing that made the entire week so very enjoyable was the way we all stayed at the camp. A real community was established in no time at all. Everyone cooked and ate together and generally a lot of the international differences were overcome. We British are often accused of being cliquey, a crisicism I can well understand as the British contingent at a meeting is usually large. We are lazy with other languages and tend not to make the effort when it comes to communication. Ronneby was different. There was a real feeling of true friendship amongst a bunch of people with one thing in common . . . racing the best boat in the world, the INTERNATIONAL FIREBALL.

And the racing was good, the courses were well set, if a little on the short side by English standards. Good starts, no time wasting and a reasonable variety in windspread to test us all round. On the minus side, I think potential organisers could learn a few lessons: do have an International Jury and not a local one; throw away the five minute rule, we don't need it, it's unfair and it doesn't work; leave the racing to the sailors and put your manpower into organisation, not aggravation.
